Staying Informed

Each month I pull together a summary of our church's Session meeting so that you can stay informed about the work that your elected leaders are doing. Much of their work happens behind the scenes: preparing the sanctuary for the church seasons, organizing coffee fellowship, taking care of repairs and maintenance, staying in touch with our mission partners, meeting with worship center and youth leaders, caring for the staff. The elders are also responsible for the budget (fun job!) and the stewardship efforts, as you have been hearing.

Decisions about the ministry of the church also come to our Session for discussion, and one of those discussions has been about the need to improve the technology in both the sanctuary and Michigan room. (Please see the Session Summary for more information about the specific upgrades to these spaces.) We will all benefit from these improvements... and we are especially excited that the sound quality for those worshiping from home will be greatly improved! The ability for those who participate from home, whether here in Holland or in another state, will also carry over for meetings and classes in the Michigan room.

One piece of this conversation that has been perplexing and anxiety producing is the addition of screens to the sanctuary. Though, from what we have heard, more members are supportive of the idea than opposed, this isn't about a simple "majority vote." We hear the serious concerns... concerns about the aesthetic changes to the sanctuary, concerns about having one screen-free space in your life, concerns about whether this will change the shape of our worship.

The Session approved the installation of screens for two reasons:

- 1. We heard from those who see this as a major accommodation for the physical challenges with which they live. Whether it is the ability to stand while holding a hymnal, or the need for a font that is even larger than what the large print bulletin provides, screens will make worship much more accessible for many.
- 2. Financially, it makes sense to install the screens while the other work is being done, and then they are there to use as we see appropriate. One use we already anticipate is for memorial services, as family members typically bring a slide show which they want to share.

Anticipation

My kids have been reading through my Calvin and Hobbes books recently. I loved Calvin and Hobbes when I was a kid (and I think I love them even more now that I am not a kid!). I asked my son, Ben, what his favorite Calvin and Hobbes strip was, and he suggested the storyline where Calvin gets his propeller beanie.

The story begins with Calvin eating box after box of sugary cereal to save enough proofs of purchase to send in to get the beanie. We are entering into the season of Advent, a season of waiting and anticipation. We aren't waiting for a propeller beanie; we are waiting for the birth of the savior. And, unlike Calvin, our anticipation will not be rewarded with disappointment, but with the promise of new life, born in a manger to bring about a new way of living.

As we journey together through Advent, let us linger in the anticipation as we await the birth of our Savior.











Worship Center: Keeping In Touch

For Christians, Advent is a time of preparation and waiting. We prepare our hearts and our lives for the birth of the baby Jesus. The book, *Faithful Families for Advent and Christmas* written by Traci Smith, shows us how by using Spiritual Practices to grow hope, peace, love and joy in our homes with fresh and engaging ideas. Preparation and waiting. Children and youth have begun rehearsals for the pageant, *A Shepherd's Story*, during the Education Hour. Our Bible Study this year is based upon justice issues and has generated much discussion. It is different than most PW studies; more based upon how justice issues face us in this time. Beyond Bible study, PW leads our focus on many justice issues, but our other focus is mission. Right here in our lovely part of Michigan we have children who are not going hungry all weekend because of Kid's Food Basket. We also have families uprooted by domestic violence who flee without many basics, like underwear, tees, socks, coats. We have a toprated preschool experience right here at FPC Holland.

RESILIENCE - We support this organization with new/unwrapped underwear for women and children. Just leave on the tags and everything. There is a basket by our elevator entrance for sharing these simple gifts.

KID'S FOOD BASKET - "Working collaboratively to meet the needs of every child and family we serve, we aim to pursue a hunger-free West Michigan in a way that promotes the experiences and passion of our local community." They have served 227,666 meals to kids in a 4-county area since 7-1-24. Our Outreach Council helps support this mission, and we decorate the lunch bags used to hand a kid a meal or weekend provisions.

PRESBYTERIAN PRESCHOOL - While PW no longer receives a \$1,000 stipend for wearing Dutch costumes for 9 busy Tulip Time days as

information guides (honestly, we don't miss that), we remain committed to supporting our preschool program. Our supply of funds we called Gail's Gift has all been given to the preschool and to support the winter women's retreat. So...help us provide support with the Quality Car Wash deals that provide about 40% of those tickets received to our preschool. Great stocking stuffers and birthday gifts. Available until Dec. 1st.

<> Session Summary <>

The Session held its regular meeting on Tuesday, November 19th. We were opened in prayer with a devotional from Ben Rund-Scott, our youth elder.

At the top of the evening's agenda was a presentation by Tim Richardson on behalf of the Buildings Council. The proposal detailed technological improvements to the sanctuary and the Michigan Room.

The sanctuary improvements include new microphones, including slender drop down mics which will be located over the chancel. This will improve the amplification of the choir, and of any spoken pieces that are shared from the chancel. The piano will also receive amplification so that their will be better balance with the organ. The technology upgrades will also greatly improve the sound quality of our worship stream. We have been well aware that the music does not come through cleanly on the YouTube version, and we would love for everyone's worship experience to include the beauty and inspiration of the music ministry.

The Michigan Room has also been of great concern. Many individuals who would like to participate in an adult education program, simply can't hear. Also, when a hybrid set up is needed, both visual and auditory aspects are a challenge. The

improvements to the Michigan Room will include the hearing aid loop, as well as wireless microphones for presenters, and a fully integrated hybrid option that will not be too difficult for members to use!

While there is still concern about screens in the sanctuary (please see the pastor's page), the Session gave full consensus to move ahead with these improvements as they are being paid for by the same generous bequest that made it possible for us to repave the parking lot, mend the roof, and upgrade the HVAC system throughout the building.

The Session then moved on to a discussion of chapter nine of Sailboat Church, "Preparing for Storms." This chapter addressed how churches can move through conflict in healthy ways. Conflicts are a reality of life in community, but how we respond to them can have a great influence on future health and stability. We had a very frank conversation, and reviewed the author's suggestions about prayer, having healthy boundaries and avoiding triangulating conversations. We also considered how we have handled conflict in the past and what we could learn from that experience.

The Session received Council reports and closed with prayer. The next regular meeting of the Session will be on December 17th.

How will the screens be used? Thoughtfully and carefully. We know that it will be important to craft guidelines for their use and we will look to other congregations for their suggestions. An example of a guideline might be that If hymns are on the screens, the music will be included (we already own the digital version of our hymnal). And if they don't prove to be a true benefit to those who hope they will be a significant improvement? Then we will reevaluate their use. The screens are one of the least expensive pieces of our upgrades.

We appreciate everyone who has shared their honest responses regarding the question of installing screens in the sanctuary. We know it isn't easy to be on what feels like "the other side" of an issue. We hope that everyone will be willing to try to experience worship after the screens are installed because we will want your feedback. But I also ask you to trust Paul and I and the worship council to make thoughtful decisions about how we use this technology.
