<u>Gratitude</u>

This past month I spent 2 weeks in Hawai'i. I was there with my DMin class learning about how the native people of Hawai'i cared for the land and how the church can care for creation by emulating the practices of the Hawai'ian people. I learned a lot and can't wait to share it with you.

Another take away from the trip was the word "mahalo". When we arrived in Hawai'i, I heard people using the word "mahalo" in place of "thank you" and I started doing the same. I didn't really know what the word meant, but when a waiter brough me food or when an uber driver dropped me off, I said, "mahalo" instead of "thank you".

In the house we were staying (in one of the bathrooms of all places) was this sign:

mahalo
[mah-ha-low] noun · Hawaiian

1. thank you, deep gratitude, admiration or praise
2. a Hawaiian blessing originally meaning "may you be in divine breath"
3. a way to express thankfulness from the bottom of your heart for the world and people around you, including the small gestures of goodness.

Suddenly, the word I had been using meant so much more to me. Mahalo wasn't a new way to say thanks, it is a word with deep spiritual meaning. As I learned more about Hawaiian culture, I came to realize that mahalo wasn't just a word, but it was a way of life. The Hawaiian people lived lives of gratitude—for each other, for the land, for the water, for the taro and the coconut.

My time in Hawai'i was a reminder to me to live a life of gratitude, for big things (like grant-funded trips to Hawai'i) and the little things (like sign on bathroom walls.)

May you be in divine breath.






<u>Presbyterian Women</u>

As we explore, *Let Justice Roll* Down: God's Call to Care for Neighbors and All Creation, we are halfway in our justice studies. We agreed that air quality affects everyone and discussed some situations where there has been successful litigation to mitigate the effects of large animal farming corporations on air and water resources. Locally we had just heard that Consumers is partnering with a new business that will, over time, reduce the fly ash on their site for use in

make concrete mixing. The complete end of burning coal for energy in our area by Holland, Grand Haven, and Consumers is well underway. We have all heard the "Let justice roll down like water..." quote from the book of Amos as a call to action.



We checked in on members' health and on those absent. We had great enthusiasm for the request to endorse a grant application to the denominational PW Thank Offering by Lakeshore Habitat for Humanity, and went on to alert the Session of our endorsement (ves. asking for forgiveness rather than permission). It would be an honor to have grant funds from the Thank Offering come to assist the repair of housing here in the greater Holland area for neighbors who qualify under the

A.L.I.C.E. umbrella. They are Asset-Limited, Income-Constrained, Employed, who have jobs and housing that needs repairs and support. MSHDA funds do not cover repairs.

We are overjoyed that new technology is coming to the Michigan Room in the tech renovations underway over the winter. Yay! Those who do not hear well are especially grateful. When we meet on 2-12-25 we can peek in to see how it is going.

Deacons <>

There are many ways to get involved serving our congregation through the Deacon care teams, using your gifts to care for each other and strengthen our community. Current ministries coordinated by the deacons include:

Visitation: homebound members and those living in nursing homes can be assigned to a visitor from the congregation who will visit about once a month. These visits are a delightful way to connect with our friends who can no longer make it to church regularly. We also have visitors who sign up to visit folks during hospitalizations or grieving to provide extra support.

Cards: The card team receives regular emails when there are special needs in our congregation so that we can express support, care, joy, and celebration.

Meals: The Nourishers team receives invitations to provide meals for families after surgeries, hospitalizations, births, etc.

Transportation: The Transporters team provides rides to medical appointments for folks who are unable to drive

Handy Workers: The handy worker team provides light home repairs or other practical needs around the home.

Care Closet: Deacons maintain a list of durable medical equipment available to borrow from members of our congregation and connect folks with items as needed.

Home Communion: Any member who has been previously ordained as an elder or deacon can be part of our home communion program. We bring communion to homebound folks as an extension of our celebration of the Lord's Supper in worship on the first Sunday of the month. Teams of at least 2 elders or deacons serve communion to those who request.
